



Introduction to SAPC



Department of Public Health - Substance Use Prevention and Treatment (SAPC)

 SAPC's mission leads and facilitates the delivery of a full spectrum of prevention, treatment and recovery support services proven to reduce the impact of substance abuse and addiction.







Substance Abuse Prevention & Control

Prevention First, Treatment Works, & Recovery is Possible!

- Committed to reducing the impact of substance use, abuse and addiction in Los Angeles County
- Lead and facilitate the delivery of a full spectrum of prevention, treatment, and recovery support services.
- Maintain a Network of contracted agencies that provide easily accessible, effective, and patientcentered services.
- Over 80 contracted providers in more than County 355 locations throughout Los Angeles County.



Illicit Substance Use During Pandemic

Two national studies suggest increased illicit drug use

Environment

Agent

• Nationally, suspected overdose submissions rose by 18% in March, 29% in April, and 42% in May 2020 compared to

same months in 2019.



Alcohol Use During the COVID-19 Pandemic

Early national studies indicate:

- Alcohol consumption has gone up overall and among women.
- Teen alcohol use has not gone up however frequency and parental permissiveness has increased.
- Alcohol sales have increased.



Alcohol Use During the Pandemic, locally

In Los Angeles County, one study (1) indicated:

- Binge drinking increased among all populations
- 42% of respondents made use of regulatory relief measures (buying alcohol through delivery or to-go from an on-sale licensee).



Factors Potentially Driving Increased Use - Policy

- Are local and state alcohol policies and regulations shifting to accommodate businesses during COVID-19 restrictions without public health considerations?
- Relaxed restrictions on alcohol retailers
- Home delivery options (reduced ID, no contact delivery)
- Alcohol take-out, and curbside pickup in their community



Factors Potentially Driving Increased Use - Individual

- Unemployment
- Mental illness
- Social isolation
- Change in treatment seeking behavior



COVID-19 and SAPC Services – Treatment and Prevention



Treatment Services During the Pandemic

- Modest reductions in both clients and claims across LOC and age groups overall.
 - Significant increase in claims for Recovery Support Services
 - Modest increase in claims for Intensive Outpatient Services
 - Modest increase in Recovery Bridge Housing Clients and Claims



Challenges to SUD Treatment Services

- Eligible clients including symptomatic or positive for COVID-19
- Arriving at facilities without prescreening
- Opioid Treatment Program and take-home medications
- Relocation of CENS counselors
- Suspended DUI program activities



SAPC Treatment Services Response

- Providing remote services
 - Telehealth for Outpatient Services
 - In-person group sessions
 - ASAM assessments are available via telephone or telehealth.



Challenges to SUD Prevention Services

- Restrictions to Services
 - Youth Education and Alternative Efforts
 - Providing Outreach to the Community
 - Meth Media Campaign
- Added Risk Factors
 - Reduced Regulations / Relaxing of Restrictions
 - Lack of already scarce resources, especially in underserved areas
 - Additional stress and mental health issues





SAPC Prevention Services Response


- Be innovative



NO WRONG DOOR PATHWAYS TO ACCESS ALCOHOL/DRUG TREATMENT

1

SASH

(Substance Abuse Service Helpline) 1-844-804-7500

A 24/7 toll-free helpline where a team of professionals is available to provide screening, resources and referral directly to alcohol/drug treatment provider. 2

CORE Centers

(Connecting to Opportunities for Recovery and Engagement)

Community spaces throughout LAC where staff provide alcohol/drug education, resources and in-person screening and linkage to treatment. 3

CENS

(Client Engagement and Navigation Services)

Sites throughout LAC where staff serve as liaisons between state, County, and city agencies and alcohol/drug treatment providers conducting in-person navigation, screening, and linkage to treatment.

4

SUD Providers

(self-referrals)

Any person (or their representative) can contact alcohol/drug treatment providers directly or by using the Online Provider Directory to link into or find out more about treatment options.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE SERVICE HELPLINE

- 1.844.804.7500
- Toll-free, available 24/7, year-round
- Interpretation available, including TTY



1. Anyone can call the SASI (adults, youth 12+), but for referrals, the person needing treatment must also be present

2. Professional staff (clinician or counselor) conduct a screening and helps to connect the caller to a treatment provider that meets their needs.

3. An appointment can be scheduled with the provider while both the person and the SASH operator are on the line.

(During provider's normal business hours)


